'I am a ROBOT monkey'






We explored the book, drawing pictures to match the words and then practised telling and writing our own stories. To complement the book we wrote silly sentences and non-sense books.

We really loved writing silly sentences for our teaches to read.








The Mermaid's family life





We are Palaeontologists

Focus: Dinosaurs and the Triassic Period

Following our interest in dinosaurs, the children decided to become Palaeontologists. We explored how palaeontologists first came to discover dinosaurs, what tools they use and how they carefully uncover bones. The children set up their own excavating sites in our sand areas and carefully uncovered some scary dinosaur bones, then pieced the bones together to build the skeleton.



The children also explored the features of the Triassic period comparing it to our local environment. They concluded that were dinosaurs to roam our school grounds it would be dangerous for children to play outside at lunch time!

Finally, after discussing why dinosaurs are not around today and the theories behind their extinction, the children researched all about volcanoes. They were happy to hear there are no Volcanoes in Birmingham!

We are Scientists

Focus: Volcanic Experiments

Upon learning about dinosaurs and how they became extinct, the children began asking questions on how volcanoes work. We decided to conduct some experiments of our own. The children began with making some 3D volcanic models and decorating them with Earthy reds, browns and greys.

On the second lesson the children conducted some scientific experiments to see whether the all-time classic 'bicarbonate of soda and vinegar' experiment works better to create a magnificent volcanic eruption or the exciting 'Coke and Mentos' experiment. The children



made predictions, discussed what they think would happen, then readied their resources and took their experiment outside. The experiments produced some fantastic results and opened the children's minds to some amazing problem solving opportunities.

Focus Artist: **John House** Focus Art Work: Clay Fossils



This half term we have travelled back in time to the Triassic period. We started the topic by exploring some fossils, discussing what they may potentially be and why they were trapped in stone. Inspired by the fossil artist John House, the children made a variety fossils using natural resources. We took a walk through the school and collected some twigs, berried, seeds sycamore seeds and leaves. The children used these natural materials as impression tools to make fossil patterns in clay. Some even arranged these materials as dinosaur bones to make dinosaur skeletons. Working with all that clay developed the children's motor skills through manipulating, moulding, squeezing and pressing. The children explored the beautiful patterns found in nature which have been around for millions of years.








We then moved onto looking at photography—in particular photos of the Earth from Space.

We have been learning about how dinosaurs roamed the Earth and were interested in what the Earth looks like. We looked at globes and then looked at photographs of the Earth taken from Space.
