Dear Parent/Carers,

Pupils across Year 2 have been busy with their learning about measurement in maths and writing traditional tales in English. Over the Whitsun holiday (May half term break), please use this opportunity for pupils to practise measuring liquid (capacity) using a measuring jugs, measuring length with a rule or tape measure, and weighing the mass of food with kitchen scales. This will support pupils with reading scales in intervals of 2, 5, 10 and 20 to support their year 2 learning. Year 2 pupils have developed their writing skills; we would love to see more pupils form their letters neatly and accurately - can they write a fairy tale with a twist for you, just like how they have recently done at school?

In June, we will be assessing pupils for their end of Key Stage 1 assessments in Reading, Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling, Maths and Writing, as well as pupils who didn't quite manage to exceed 32/40 for their Phonics screening in autumn last year. I'd like to take this opportunity to remind parents that My ON is a fantastic website for pupils to read books from, after which they can practice their comprehension skills by completing a book quiz through Accelerated Reader. Your child's teacher will be able to share their log in details for these two websites.

Finally, just a reminder that the summer 1 term ends at the end of Friday and school re-opens on Monday 7th June at 08.30 a.m. Over the next few weeks, we can look forward to some exciting school events in the weeks ahead! Thank you all for your support throughout and have a safe and relaxing break.



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Maths

During this half term, Year 2 have explored a range of different measurements, including: length, height, capacity, mass and temperature. We have used a variety of resources and equipment to actively explore how to accurately measure different objects using standard and non-standard units of measure.

Children commenced the term recalling the fundamentals to measurements. They then began to develop their understanding of capacity. To understand what capacity is and how to measure capacity. Children engaged in practical experiments and discussions based on their observations. Children further developed their understanding on units of measure. Year 2 measured the weight of different objects using scales and compared the mass of a range of objects.

At Waverley School, we encourage and enrich our pupils with on-going opportunities to take an active approach to learning. Children have had the privilege to participate in creative ways of measuring volume and capacity of water which involved using cups and bottles. Children also measured the length of many different objects, including using a metre ruler to measure the length of the classroom. Additionally, children were presented with the opportunity to measure their own height, compare and order different classmates' heights in order of shortest to tallest.

It has been a hugely enjoyable topic and term, where children have taken great responsibility and pride in their learning. Next half term, Year 2 will be looking at Problem Solving and efficient methods, Statistics and Investigations. Be a rock star!!!






English



Cinderboy










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

<u>Ursula</u>



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Phonics



What is Phonics?

Phonics is a method for teaching people how to read and write an alphabetic language. It is done by demonstrating the relationship between the sounds of the spoken language, and the letters or groups of letters or syllables of the written language.

What is the expected phonics phase for children at the end of Year 2?

At the end of Year 2, children are expected to be at Phase 6. Phase 6 phonics is taught explicitly throughout Year 2 with the intention of encouraging pupils to become fluent readers and fantastic, accurate spellers. By Phase 6, children should be able to decode many words using phonics without the need to overtly segment and blend, rather they should be able to read the word automatically without hesitation, even polysyllabic words should become a breeze!





Common Exception Words

What are Common Exception Words (CEW)?

Common exception words are words that do not follow the common phonetic spelling rules children learn in Year 1 and Year 2. Many of these exception words are used frequently, hence the use of 'common' in the name. Common Exception words may also be known as tricky words or high frequency words. In Y2 there are 64 CEW that children are expected to learn by the end of the year, they are expected to know how to read or pronounce the words as well as spell them all correctly.

How have Year 2 incorporated CEW in English?

In English, Y2 have been writing mixed up Fairy tales this half-term. During English lessons, children have engaged in starter activities that complement and support their understanding and learning of the CEW. Each week children would receive 'spellings' or CEW that were the focus for that particular week. The class teachers and teaching assistants would discuss the meanings of 'focus' words and highly encourage children to utilise the CEW in their writing. Exemplary efforts of incorporating CEW in writing from children would be highly praised using verbal praise, stickers and referring to Waverley School's Good to be Green behaviour chart.

Progress from Autumn to Spring term

It is with pleasure to inform you that most children across Y2 have made progress in both reading and writing CEW from the Autumn term to the end of Spring term. However, outcomes indicate that children across Y2 are more fluent in reading CEW than writing CEW. It is on that note that we kindly ask all parents to support their children with writing and spelling CEW so that by the end of Summer term children will be as fluent in writing CEW as they are reading CEW. These last couple of weeks have been very exciting for year 2 pupils! For our Geography unit we learnt all about the different countries around the world and how we can use maps, satellite navigation devices and the globe to identify their location. It was exciting to see children identify different countries using the globe and work out how far or short the distance was from one country to another. Children also recapped the 7 seven continents and 5 major oceans using their previous knowledge. We then moved on to comparing the culture of Brazil and the UK focusing on their lifestyle, food and the sports they take part in. It was interesting to see children become fascinated by the information they learnt from their research using internet. Children then used the information they gathered to write up their non-chronological report on Brazil while using interesting adjectives and conjunctions to add detail to their writing.

In the recent weeks, year 2 have been learning all about plants and how to observe the growth of seeds overtime. It was amazing to see children learn and understand the scientific vocabulary when making comparisons and to use simple equipment to make simple measurements. Our science lessons mainly consisted of performing simple tests and using observations and ideas to suggest ideas to answers. Towards the end of the unit children used the information they gathered over the weeks to record data for their evaluation. It was a great experience and one they thoroughly enjoyed!

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Traffic Light Letters

In recent weeks, parents will have begun receiving a traffic light colour coded letter: red, yellow, green or gold. The colour of the letter received by each pupil indicates the pupil's level of attendance for the Summer 1 term. Traffic light letters will be sent home termly so that you are regularly informed of your son or daughter's attendance levels.

- · Gold letter: 100% attendance. This is perfect attendance and a fantastic achievement for parents and pupils!
- Green letter: 97% attendance and above. This gives the children the best chances of success. This is good attendance.
- Amber letter: attendance below 97%. This is a cause for concern and there needs to be an improvement. Attendance will be monitored and meetings maybe scheduled to discuss ways to improve attendance and provide support.
- **Red letter: attendance below 90%.** This is poor attendance with serious concern. Persistent absence can have a huge impact on children's learning. Meetings will be arranged with parents or carers to discuss ways to improve attendance and provide support. An improvement in attendance is essential.

Come to school, on time, every day, ready to learn.

Attendance during Summer 1 for the whole of the Primary Phase was 92.1%. We are working harder to getting our attendance to where it needs to be— but are not there yet! In order to reach and exceed our target, we need all families on board and all pupils in lessons learning.

Attendance for this half term, for Year 2 to date, **is 93.3%.** The school target of 97% attendance for each pupil is more important now than ever. With months of learning lost due to COVID-19, pupils are working hard to meet the expectations of the new year group and missing even a day puts each child behind.

Each day new learning is shared with pupils. Every day that your child misses from school results in them missing out on education and essentially falling behind. It is every parent and carers responsibility to ensure that all pupils are in school, every day and on time.

All **Year 2 pupils** should be in school and seated for **8.35 am.** The register is taken at this time. Any pupil not in school at this time is marked late, which is recorded on the register and negatively impacts on your child's attendance percentage. Primary doors and gates open 5 minutes before the official start time ready for registration. This allows pupils enough time to get to their class, take off their coat and bag and be sat at their desk ready for learning to commence at 8.35 a.m.

The school has a dedicated absence line and if your child is absent for any reason please call on **0121 566 6600**, **using the pupil absence line on option 1** and leave a message.

Medical and dental appointments should be arranged outside of the school day to ensure that pupils are in school and are learning. If, however, an appointment can only be obtained at a certain time, for example hospital appointments, an appointment card must be presented to authorise your child's appointment.

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
