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

#### English

The children in Year 2 have been very busy looking at poetry, non-chronological reports (about noctumal animals such as barn owls) and story writing! We focused on the author Roald Dahl. We looked at stories by Roald Dahl in Reading to enhance our learning and immerse into this authors style of writing. We




enjoyed making potions like Georges



Marvellous medicine and acting out scenes from Cinderella. All of these learning opportunities helped us understand the characters better. We started the term off by writing poetry in the style of Roald Dahl focusing on his book Revolting Rhymes. We thoroughly enjoyed creating rhyming words. Later in the term we wrote a non chronological report on owls.

We consolidated our previous learning on


full stops and capital letters. We even challenged ourselves to use adverbs and questions. We ended the term with writing our own version of Fantastic Mr Fox!







This term we have been working hard with our phonics. As the phonics screening was not done in Year I, we started this process from the end of November and you will get the results of your child's performance in due course. Phonics tests are made up of a combination of real and nonsense words. Reading daily with your child at home will help them with their phonics ability and help them to achieve to their full potential.



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






For next term, children will learn all about fractions, will explore making and recognising equal and unequal parts as well as using both real life objects and pictorial representations of a variety of shapes and quantities.

#### Common Exception Words

Common exception words are tricky words that your child should know by the end of year 2. This term we have been using common exception words in most of our lessons in order for children to recognise and remember them. Please do practice these at home to ensure children knows how to spell them. The teaching staff in year 2 moderate all of the English writing and look out for these words. 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#### Year 3



This half term, the children have been basing their writing on our key text called 'The Story of Tutankhamun.' We have explored the features of information texts and after following instructions, we have written our own instructions for mummification. We have applied our knowledge of the Egyptians to persuade readers to visit Egypt and we will be emailing our brochures and leaflets in computing lessons. Children have been adding detail to sentences with adjectives, adverbs, conjunctions and varying sentence openers. We have focused upon the correct, consistent choice of punctuation marks in our writing looking at statements, questions and commands and have been using coordinating and subordinating conjunctions to extend sentences. In spelling, we have been looking at spelling rules for adding prefixes and suffixes to root words including the prefixes: anti, auto, mis and dis. Pupils will continue to look at spelling rules after half term and should continue to practise their weekly spellings.

We learnt about superlatives and comparative adjectives in our persuasive writing. I used rhetorical questions to engage the reader. Child in 3A

I enjoyed English because we read about mummification. We learnt how to use subordinating and coordinating conjunctions in our instructions instruction.

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#### Year 3

In maths pupils have been focusing upon multiplication and division. Children have been using the written method to support them in multiplying two digit numbers by one digit and used the written method to divide. Pupils have also moved onto dividing with remainders using their knowledge of their times tables.

In addition, they have been looking at money, identifying the coins notes used to make amounts and recognising the value of each. Pupils have learnt to add amounts of money using written and mental strategies.

Next term, pupils will be focusing upon length and perimeter, fractions and statistics.

Pupils should continue to practise their times tables daily using TTRS and MyMaths. We have been really impressed with pupils knowledge of their 3, 4, and 8 times tables. Children need to continue to apply their knowledge of these facts and begin to look at their 6 and 7 times tables.

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
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It has been an exciting term for students in Science this half term. Our topics have covered 'All Living Things'

and 'Animals (including humans)'. Pupils have learned all about life cycles, habitats, life processes and healthy living. One of our most exciting lessons involved exploring local microhabitats in the school grounds. We carefully lifted stones, and observed the muddy areas on the grass; our finds included slugs, a spider and (our greatest find) two worms!

During our healthy living lessons, we conducted an experiment to investigate the effect exercise had on our bodies. Each class learnt how to take their pulses and enjoyed marching, standing and star jumping on the spot to see which activity made their heart rates highest. I know the teachers enjoyed this as much as the pupils, with the children filled with excitement throughout!



In this term we have learnt the colours and reviewed greetings in Spanish. We have practised the colours by singing different songs as "Los Colores" and reading



the story 'Elmer', which apart from colours; values such as diversity or tolerance are included into its narrative. Next term we will be learning about the numbers 1-20 in Spanish


### Spanish in Year 3


In Year 3, for Spanish, we have learnt 10 common animals plus their appropriate indefinite article/determiner. We have practised the grammatical structure "Soy" (I am) and we have also learnt how to categorise nouns by gender (un or una).

Next term, we will be learning phonics (ca, ce, ci, co, cu), read and play out a story called "A Luis le encantan las serpientes" and learning about

Spanish culture and festivities (Fallas de Valencia).

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The NTP was launched by the government for the academic year 2020-21 to support teachers and schools in providing a sustained response to the coronavirus pandemic and to provide a longer-term contribution to closing the attainment gap through tutoring provided by Tuition Partners. The TP programme is designed to provide additional support to schools and teachers, as a supplement (not a replacement) to the high-quality teaching that the school provides in English and Maths.

Waverley School has selected Ranstad, which is a very established tutoring company. We have opted to provide this tuition to all of our Year 2 pupils. Normally this would cost in the region of £25-£50 an hour if booked privately, however the school is paying for your child to access high quality tuition- 15 hours in total. The sessions provided by Ranstad will take place online and will run after school.

The TP will commence after the upcoming Spring half-term holiday. Your child's participation in all sessions will support him/her to work towards end of year 2 attainment goals, to catch up on any gaps in essential learning and access learning in year 2 onwards.

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#### -Year 3 Spring | Topics-

This half term the children focussed on Ancient Egyptians. They had a WOW experience by exploring the different artefacts from the Egyptian times loaned to us from Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery.

The children were very fascinated and intrigued with the artefacts. We started to learn about Egypt by looking at the timeline and discovering where this era fitted in the timeline.

The children explored where Egypt is located and then looked at the importance of the River Nile. Furthermore, they looked closely at the different beliefs and the customs of the Egyptians and how they differed from today. The children also looked at an important person, Howard Carter and his discoveries. They also explored the idea of mummification, the different processes of mummification. The children wrote instructions of how to mummify their dear friend. Thus, they learned about the different pharaohs and the boy king called Tutankhamun. Additionally, the children also learned the Egyptian writing systems and how to Egyptians used hieroglyphics to communicate. We discovered the alphabet was in symbols and how the Egyptians communicated by drawing on the walls of the temples to retell the stories.





In recent weeks, the Year 3 children explored more D&T fundamentals in topic lessons. They continued with the Ancient Egyptian topic and looked at the different structures from the Ancient Egyptian times for example the Sphinx, the Great Pyramid and the Temples. They used arts and crafts to design these structures. The children had to think carefully about the size, shape of the structure and think about what materials they were originally made out of and their properties.

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We had a day where we looked at the DT exhibition from all the structures created within year 3 classes and evaluated our designs.

Ilhaan "The biggest pyramid is called Giza, there are different structures we learnt about like the temples and the Sphinx."

Ridwan "We made pyramids with cardboard, tissue paper and decorated it."

Ibrahim K. "The pyramids were discovered in 2500 BC and they are made out of limestone and sand. The pyramids are hard and rocky."





In Spring 2, the children in year 3 will be focussing on Science. Looking at exploring animals including humans. We will be looking at sorting foods into different groups. Looking at the different nutrients each food types provides. We will look at the different foods and how much nutrition each food has. We will look at the different labels on the food packets and tins and read them. The children will move onto looking at the skeleton and labelling it and grouping animals into vertebrates and invertebrates. The children will be looking at the muscles and learning how the muscles protect the animals and humans.

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#### Year 3: Our Resilient Readers!

Learning to read is about listening and understanding as well as working out what's printed on the page. Through hearing stories, children are exposed to a wide range of words. This helps them build their own vocabulary and improve their understanding when they listen, which is vital as they start to read. It's important for children to understand how stories work too. Even if your child doesn't understand every word, they'll hear new sounds, words and phrases which they can then try out, copying what they have heard.



#### Whole Class Reading

Every day for 30 minutes, each class sit together for whole class reading with their peers and teachers. In year 3, we have been focusing on the The Ancient Egyptians and the Famous Pharaoh Tutankhamun while being immersed into the world of Ancient Egyptians.

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#### Home Readers

Waverley School pupils take a book home to read each week which should be read to parents, siblings and/or carers daily and recorded in their planners. Your child will be heard reading the book to an adult on a weekly basis where they can share all the fun information they have learnt.

As children start to learn to read at school, you can play an important role in helping to keep them interested in books. Find out what interests them, help them to find books that will be engaging and fun, and spend time reading the books they bring home from school together.



Some of the things you can do include:

- Reading aloud to your child, talking about the words and pictures, and sharing ideas about the book
- Reading yourself children who see adults reading, and enjoying it, are much more likely to want to read themselves.
- Surrounding your child with books you don't need hundreds of books at home, but go to the library or bookshop regularly to borrow books spend time together, browse and make choices. you can read the books your child takes home, In this way, reading becomes a habit!

Topic- To investigate what healthy eating means and what we need to do in order to maintain healthy eating.

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
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#### LIBRARY CLUB

#### Religious Education
