Halfway Holiday

This term has been incredibly exciting as the pupils in the Resource Base explored the topic of holidays. The children had the opportunity to develop their core writing skills by writing for a range of different purposes, including informal letters, dialogues between characters, poems, and diary entries.

Pupils have been focusing on writing initial sounds for key words from our topic book called 'Is It Warm Enough For Ice Cream?' The children have also been focusing on key concepts related to our topic 'Holidays', for example 'features of a setting' using a communication board, alongside spoken vocabulary. The children have also used visual pictures of various holiday destination to choose their favourite holiday destination to visit.

Pupils have been learning about positional language through hands-on experiences. This has helped children to understand the importance of using accurate language to describe turns and positions in everyday life.






Shapes









Bonds, Number Bonds.


Class 1C Celebrate Diversity

This half term pupils completed their phonics screening check, all the pupils made their teachers very proud! Thanks to all parents/ carers for your continued support!










Budding Artists

Year 1 have been studying the sculptures of Jeff Koons and Louise Bourgeois. They have created artist copies of Jeff Koon's 'Balloon Dogs' using crayons and clay. They have also carried out an observational study of a spider using pencil. We have painted and varnished our sculptures once they dried.





Pupils have been studying the poem 'The Magic Box' by Kit Wright. We explored the adjectives and imagery that the poet uses, and the features of a list poem. Pupils enjoyed exploring the class's 'Curiosity Box' which featured some of the items that are in 'The Magic Box'. This curiosity developed children's creative language, encouraging them to use imaginative adjectives.

A Virtual Visit to Brazil

Year 2 pupils have been learning about Brazil and how it compares to the UK. Pupils learnt about traditional and modern textiles in Brazil. Pupils were also astonished to learn about deadly creatures like mosquitoes and the anaconda in the Amazon Rainforest! Pupils also enjoyed learning about the traditional meal of Brazil: Arroz (rice), Feijao (Beans), Farofa (tapioca flour made dish), mayoca frita (fried Yuca) and tomato secu (sundried tomatoes).






Class 2C British Values Assembly

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

The Secret Garden




Shape

In Mathematics lessons, pupils learnt all about shapes. They explored the differences between parallel and perpendicular lines. As well as the different features of 2-D and 3-D shapes. To support their learning, they made nets of 3-D shapes to investigate the edges, vertices and surfaces of different shapes. The pupils also enjoyed learning about angles within a shape and the different types of angles.

Pupils in Year 4 attended a curriculum trip to Birmingham Roundhouse Canals as part of their Summer 2 topic: Along the Canals. They began the guided tour by learning all about the history of canals and the significance it had on Birmingham especially the trade and tourism industry. Soon after, Year 4 pupils had the amazing experience to ride across Birmingham in style on a narrow boat that was built in 1873 to truly experience how life was like during the Victorian era. Multiplication Table Check

The Year 4 team want to thank all parents and carers for their continuous support throughout the year to prepare pupils for the Multiplication Table Check. This half term pupils completed their final times table check and the results were our best!



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Statistics

Pupils in Year 4 have worked hard in Mathematics lessons. We have focused on statistics, where pupils were able to interpret pictograms, bar charts and line graphs. To introduce the topic, Year 4 took part in a practical lesson where they organised data (counters) into colours. They turned this information into a tally chart. Using the tally chart, pupils were then able to create their own bar chart that represented the data they had collected. Once this was complete, pupils were able to present their data to the class, discussing which colours were the least/ most popular, the difference between colours etc. Pupils have thoroughly enjoyed this topic and have worked extremely hard.

Pupils have enjoyed reading, 'The Boy at the Back of the Class'. Pupils tried to understand how it feels to be a refugee boy who was an immigrant arriving to the UK from a war-torn country. Using this test as a stimulus, Year 4 wrote a letter to the Prime Minister to argue for asylum seekers to be allowed in to the UK for a better life and to contribute positively to the UK economy.

Online Safety Newsletter

Quora

Quora should only be accessed by users that are 13+. Quora is a question-and-answer site. You do need to set up an account to see and post replies.

Due to the nature of the site, users can communicate with strangers, either through the Q&A boards, spaces or via private messages.

Private messaging can be turned off in settings and users can block other users.

Quora is a platform where users can post publicly. If your child is using this site, then please ensure your child understands that they should not share personal information. As content is user generated, talk to your child about how information they read online may not be factually correct. Your child may also come across content and topics that are not age appropriate.

Safe Searching

There is so much online that we would not want our child to view and even an innocent search can result in inappropriate content being seen. To make our child's online world safer, we would firstly recommend switching on Safesearch settings for the search engine your child uses. However, as not all search engines allow you to 'lock' Safesearch on (so users



may be able to simply turn it off), we would encourage you to apply further parental controls.

For some search engines, for example Google, you can set up a Family management account, which will ensure that Safesearch settings cannot be switched off. We would recommend using a family management account (either Google or Microsoft) so even if your child is using a search engine that cannot be locked, there will at least be an additional level of content filtering provided.

In addition to the above, make sure you have set up appropriate parental controls on your home broadband (and any consoles/ devices/ apps/ websites that your child uses/accesses) for example, to restrict access to explicit websites or access to websites that are not suitable for children.

Please remember that no filtering/ parental control is 100% safe, so it is important that you talk to your child about how they can stay safe online and that they should talk to you or another trusted adult if they need to.

Online Challenges

Our children may not have developed the skills and ability to critically analyse all situations yet so it is important to talk to your child about hoaxes and challenges that may appear on the internet. Some challenges are fun and provide no risk, however there will be challenges that are risky/dangerous. Your child may see others complete certain challenges online without being harmed and therefore may want to repeat them and not consider the



potential risks to themselves. Make sure they know that they should talk to you (or another trusted adult) about what they see online, particularly if they plan to try a challenge or if something scares or upsets them.

We would always advise that if your child has not heard about an online challenge, then do not draw attention to it as this may lead to them searching for it out of curiosity, so just talk about challenges in a general sense. Reassure your child that challenges that suggest that bad things will happen if they do not complete the tasks are not real.
