This term, as part of our topic, 'Festivals'. The children have learnt about Eid, Diwali and Christmas. Children took part in creating Diya lamps, where they moulded the Diya lamp using clay and then decorated them using paint and sequins. 

Reception have been learning all about numbers up to 5. They have expored how to find the number which is 1 more than the given number. The children used numicon shapes, tens frames and part part whole concepts to process and understand.




They also had the opportunity to compete with their friends on who can place the counter on the correct numeral to match the quantity without counting the dots.





Children then learned how to follow instructions and make jelly which allowed them to recall the steps taken to write instructions using their phonics knowledge.




Our literacy focus this term has been the story "Supertato" by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet. All the children learned to retell the story by reading the text map and adding some actions to help them recall.





All of our reception children learned to keep our teeth healthy and the need to brush them in the morning and before going to sleep at night. They learned the brushing teeth song and followed the actions to go with it.





Children have been learning about "Healthy Me!" They learned about different types of vegetables such as ground and root vegetables like, potato turnips, carrots and then peas, broccoli and cauliflower. Children talked about how potatoes can be used to make a variety of dishes and what is their favourite potato dish.





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Year 1 Team

We have learnt some amazing things in Mathematics lessons this half-term. Children started with learning place value within 10. This included knowing how to use a part-whole model, a tens frame and a number line. They used the skill they learn and applied it to solving addition and subtraction number equation within

As part of our topic 'Foods Around the World', children visited ASDA superstore and learned about different foods; how they are stored, delivered, and sold. After the trip, pupils tasted some exotic fruits and used their senses to describe them. They enjoyed learning about the different food groups and how to create a balanced dish. The project culminated in pupils' making their own healthy salad.





Year 1 had an amazing opportunity to visit Twycross Zoo and they loved every moment of it! The children started with The Gruffalo walk, which they really enjoyed. They saw different types of gibbons in the Gibbon Forest as well as a baby gibbon clinging on to its mother. We saw a snow leopard with her cubs and an incredible tiger, which the children were really excited to see. Overall, Year 1 had an amazing time and learnt about different habits and diet requirements for the animals.





To get in to the festive mood, the children learnt about the Christian story 'The Nativity'. The children learnt about Christmas traditions. As part of the unit the children wrote a letter to Santa asking for a present for the classroom. The children learnt about the features of a letter and how a letter should be written.



Children turned themselves in to scientists to investigate seasonal changes and made observations about the weather in Winter, compared to other seasons. Pupils used scientific equipment such as thermometers and made rain gauges, anemometers to measure weather changes.



We then moved on to 2D and 3D shapes. The children began to recognise and name 2D and 3D shapes. They drew pictures using only 2D shapes, which they really enjoyed! They also, recognised and completes patterns with 2D and 3D shapes.

This half term Year 1 have produced some fantastic writing outcomes! The first unit this half term was about Rama and Sita. The children enjoyed learning about the characters and the plot. The children worked very hard during this topic and as a result they wrote a beautiful short narrative.


Year 2 children were intrigued to learn about the harm smoke can cause and most importantly, how to keep safe through a fun, engaging and interactive workshop on Carbon Monoxide. A great way of working towards the UN's 2030 sustainability goals!



Children were also able to recall and use addition and subtraction facts to 20 and use related facts to 100. As well as this, children were taught to count in their 2, 5, 3 and 10 times table. We further investigated solving addition and subtraction equations using column method.

The children also had the opportunity to learn about 2D and 3D shapes. The children have enjoyed exploring shapes and everyday objects to support their learning and can now describe the properties of these shapes.





Year 2 children were thrilled to conduct experiments during their Science workshop. They made slime and learnt about hydrophobic and hydrophilic.

On a sunny Sunday morning I woke up filled with confusion. People were screaming and I didn't know what was happening. I then realized something was happening outside. When I looked outside I saw red, blazing, huge flames that were coming from the bakery.

During the first part of this half term in English we have been learning about the great Fire of London, following on from the inspirational workshop we had at the start of the term. We read historical fiction books linked to the period, Toby and the Great Fire of London, The Bakers Boy and Fire! Fire. During the topic we write diary entry recounts and practised our descriptive writing. We then had a go at writing our own historical fiction stories based in London at the time of the fire.

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
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
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
Year 3 Team

Children have enjoyed learning all about Ancient Egypt. They explored the importance of the Pharaoh and why people believed they were Gods. Children also learnt about the process of mummification, writing about it in their English lessons and exploring the wonders of the Egyptian pyramids. The children focused on the importance of hieroglyphs and how Ancient Egyptians used them to communicate. They even created some of their own!











The children in Year 3 have produced some amazing writing outcomes! Children wrote a letter inviting their parents to come and visit an exciting Egyptian exhibition! The children learnt a range of persuasive language techniques and were able to include many of them in their independent writes.

Children then wrote a set of instructions detailing how to mummify your dear friend! From using imperative words to clear sentence openers, the children were able to write a brilliant



In Mathematics lessons, the children have been exploring multiplication and division. They learnt about how equal groups using arrays and representing numbers using pictorial representations. Children have focussed on multiples of 2, 5, 10's and 2, 4, and 8's. To support his, we have used sentence stems, which has supported pupils' reasoning and problem solving skills.

Year 4 children have enjoyed reading a variety of fiction/non-fiction books this term. First, we began our short unit based on 'The Christmas Truce', where children wrote an emotional letter to their parents from a soldier's perspective. We then spent the remaining weeks looking at our new class text: 'Who let the gods out?' From this, the children wrote a non-chronological report using key features such as, heading, sub-headings, brackets, dashes and much more!




As always, there has been a strong focus on Times tables where children practise and are assessed on a weekly basis. Children are encouraged to practise their times table at home using TTRS.



In Mathematics, Year 4 children have been learning about multiplication and division. They have been multiplying and dividing by 10s, 100s and 1000s. We then moved onto factor pairs where they had to use their understanding from previous lessons through different representations like arrays, base 10, counters and bar models. The children have worked in groups and pairs for practical lessons and then moved onto individual tasks such as reasoning and problem-solving questions.





This half-term pupils have enjoyed taking part in our science topic; all about teeth and digestion. Pupils explored the different types of teeth and their purpose.

We then conducted a science experiment, where pupils investigated which liquid would decay our teeth the quickest and why. To do this, they produced a scientific report which included an aim, hypothesis, method, table of results and conclusion. Pupils used an egg to represent the teeth and placed them into four different liquids; milk, water, orange juice and coke. Over five days, pupils observed the changes and wrote a conclusion, discussing their findings.





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
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Year 5 Team

In English this half term, Year 5 have been researching the devastating Mount Vesuvius eruption in Ad 79. Children had an opportunity to take on the role of a journalist and report on this event and use their research to write a newspaper account reporting on this incident. It was great to see the children develop their writing skills and as a result they published some great writing pieces. Another genre that we covered this half term is historical fiction. The children wrote a story based on the aftermath of the Vesuvius volcanic eruption.



Our Year 5 and 6 children were given the exciting opportunity to receive peer mediation training. Peer mediation is the process in which children can help their peers handle and sort out disagreements and arising conflicts.



We began this half term by exploring multiplication which included multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000, finding multiples, factors, prime numbers and much more. After this, the children moved onto fractions where they explored equivalent fractions, converting mixed numbers and improper fractions and adding and subtracting fractions- all of which required children to use their multiplication knowledge.

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
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Year 6 Team



As part of our curriculum enrichment, Year 6 visited The National Justice Museum in Nottingham. Pupils really enjoyed exploring original courtrooms, dungeons and prison cells, along with galleries and collections relating to justice, the law, crime and punishment in a fun and interactive way. Pupils even took part in a mock trial.

After consolidating learning on the four operations we focussed on Fractions where the children further developed their learning on subtracting, adding, multiplying and dividing fractions. After this, the children moved onto converting units where they looked at metric measures.
