	<p>Waverley is an all through school for pupils aged 4-19, with a resource base for pupils with cognition and learning difficulties. Our school community benefits greatly from our landmark award winning buildings that provide everyone with state of the art facilities for learning, teaching and training. Waverley School makes its inclusive vision a reality. We have high expectations of behaviour, attendance, uniform, achievement and attainment. We believe in every child being given the opportunity to achieve his or her potential and even go beyond. We have a strong, well-qualified and committed team of staff who aim to do this.</p>
Criteria	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Looked after children or children who were previously looked after (including previously looked after children from outside of England). 2. Children with a brother or a sister already at the school who will still be in attendance in September 2024. 3. Children of staff directly employed by Waverley Education Foundation Trust 4. Children who live nearest the school.
	<p>For entry to Year 7 in September 2024, children on roll in Year 6 at Waverley Primary School will automatically transfer to Year 7, although parents and carers will be free to submit applications for Year 7 places at other schools.</p>
	<p>Within each of these categories, priority is given to those who live nearest the school, calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between home and school.</p>
Children with a statement of special educational needs/EHC Plan	<p>Any child with a statement of special educational needs/Education Health and Care Plan is required to be admitted to the school that is named in the statement/plan. This gives such children overall priority for admission to the named school. This is not an oversubscription criterion.</p>
Looked after or previously looked after children	<p>A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangement order, or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care</p>

	<p>of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989). In the case of previously looked after children, admission authorities may request a copy of the adoption order, child arrangement order or special guardianship order and a letter from the local authority that last looked after the child confirming that he or she was looked after immediately prior to that order being made.</p> <p>Children adopted from state care outside of England. Children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted will be given equal first priority in admission arrangements, alongside looked after children (LAC) and children who were previously looked after by English local authorities (PLAC). These children are referred to as internationally adopted previously looked after children – “IAPLAC”. Evidence will be required from the carer confirming that their child meets the above criteria in accordance with the DfE’s non-statutory guidance on the admission of IAPLAC.</p>
Sibling	<p>Siblings (brothers or sisters) are considered to be those children who live at the same address and either:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i. have one or both natural parents in common; or ii. are related by a parent’s marriage; or iii. are adopted or fostered by a common parent. <p>Unrelated children living at the same address, whose parents are living as partners, are also considered to be siblings.</p> <p>Children not adopted or fostered or related by a parent’s marriage or with one natural parent in common, who are brought together as a family by a same sex civil partnership and who are living at the same address, are also considered to be siblings.</p>
Children of staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made; and/or b. The member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post at the school for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage
Distance	<p>Distances are calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the applicant’s home address and the school front gates The Local Authority uses a computerised system, which measures all distances in metres. Ordnance Survey supply the co-ordinates that are used to plot an applicant’s home address and the address of the school.</p>
Shared Responsibility	<p>Where parents have shared responsibility for a child, and the child lives with both parents for part of the week, then the main</p>

	<p>residence will be determined as the address where the child lives the majority of the week. Parents may be requested to supply documentary evidence to support the address used.</p>
Final Qualifier	<p>In a very small number of cases it may not be possible to decide between the applications of those pupils who are the final qualifiers for a place, when applying the published admission criteria.</p> <p>For example, this may occur when children in the same year group live at the same address, or if the distance between the home and school is exactly the same, for example, blocks of flats. If there is no other way of separating the application according to the admissions criteria and to admit both or all of the children would cause the Published Admission Number for the child's year group to be exceeded, the Local Authority will use a computerised system to randomly select the child to be offered the final place.</p> <p>In the event of this occurring with twins or other multiple birth applicants, schools will be asked to admit over their Published Admission Number to accommodate the pupils.</p>
Waiting Lists	<p>Waiting lists will not be fixed following the offer of places. They are subject to change. This means that a child's waiting list position during the year could go up or down. Any applicants will be added to the school's list in accordance with the order of priority for offering places. Waiting lists will be maintained until the end of each academic year.</p>
Appeals	<p>Appeals are administered by the Local Authority for this school. Parents who wish to appeal against the decision to refuse their child admission should contact the Children's Information and Advice Service on 0121 303 1888 to request an appeal form. Appeals will be heard by an independent panel.</p>
In Year Applications	<p>Applications made outside the normal admissions round (in-year admissions) should be made directly to the school. Parents/carers can apply for a place for their child at any time and to any school. On receipt of an in-year application, the school will notify the local authority of both the application and its outcome, to allow the local authority to keep up to date with figures on the availability of school places in Birmingham.</p>
